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

Report on the 2022 AGM

We were pleased to see 25 of our Members attend the AGM on a very cold Wednesday 7th December.

As is always the case, following the Chair's welcome and opening words, the old Committee stood down and the new Committee was voted in. We are now a group of 10 as John and Geraldine Pitcher have joined the former group of 8.

The Members approved the minutes of the last AGM and then received the Secretary's Report and the Treasurer's Report. The Annual Accounts were accepted by the members and everyone was pleased to hear that the Treasurer is not recommending an increase in rents – yet. The reports will shortly be available to view on the website.

Both the Secretary and Treasurer emphasised strongly the importance of members continuing to support the shop, the social events and the open morning. It is the income from these sources, and the generous donations we receive from Members, which enable us to keep the rents as low as they are. They also stressed the need for more involvement from the Membership in taking roles, or preparing to take roles, on the Committee. None of us are getting any younger and some have been on the Committee for a long time. New blood is required to keep the Society vibrant, compliant and viable. Please let me know if you have any

particular skills or interest in a committee role. We would love to hear from you.

As always, we are very dependant on our volunteers to help in the shop and at the various events – as well as helping to maintain the site, doing the odd repairs and in helping those who need it. We are very grateful for the help we receive from both Members and Associate Members, some of whom play an important part in running and maintaining the site.

The Members approved some minor amendments to the Finance and Health & Safety Policies and accepted that no changes were necessary to the IT Policy. All policy documents are available to view on our website or on request to the Secretary.

Our congratulations to the winners of our Annual Allotment Competition – details were in the last Newsletter. Unfortunately, none of the winners were at the AGM to receive their trophies.



ALLOTMENT CALENDAR

Hoe, hoe, hoe those pesky little weeds, all year!!!

JANUARY

- ⇒ Plan your plot. Buy any seeds
- ⇒ Dig bean trenches, if possible
- ⇒ Finish harvesting cabbages, carrots, sprouts, parsnips etc.
- ⇒ Check any protected veg and ventilate, on sunny days!
- ⇒ Start chitting potatoes
- ⇒ Clean tools
- ⇒ Tidy shed/greenhouse
- ⇒ Prune fruit trees (Plum in February)
- ⇒ Sow indoors broad beans, carrots, onions, tomatoes.

FEBRUARY

DON'T PLANT OUT TOO EARLY!

- ⇒ Sow, broad beans, carrots, chard, leeks, lettuce, onion, parsnips, peas, radishes, spinach, turnips.
- ⇒ Plant out early potatoes (if ground is sufficiently warm), onion sets, fruit trees & bushes

MARCH

⇒ Sow, as February plus, beetroot, broccoli, cabbages, kale, sprouts

Dahlias



You may have noticed a blaze of colour at the rear of the main allotment site during the last few months.

The dahlias there are the main attraction and are the pride and joy of Bryan Madders who

has grown them for many years and is a National Dahlia Society judge.

As well as growing for pleasure he has been trying to introduce new varieties from seed collected from his plants, with some success over the years. He is particularly pleased with a red collarette type named after his daughter Melanie Louise which has not only won a first prize at the national show at



Wisley but has for the first time been included in the society's classification guide, providing not only a first for him, but for this allotment.

More seedlings are on the way, with some optimism that they will be good enough to provide more pleasure in the future.











SPENT COFFEE GROUNDS

You may have noticed giant bags of coffee grounds in the chipping bay opposite the Big Green Shed. There is a wealth of conflicting information on the Web about the use of coffee grounds in gardening. Cutting through it all, these are the conclusions!

Useful in compost, when mixed with other 'ingredients'. Contains nitrogen and other beneficial elements. Has a roughly neutral pH. Compost worms appear to love it, but worms in the soil don't like it neat.

The spent grounds will bind together like clay soil and act as a barrier to water and smother the ground. Also may still contain caffeine which appears to stunt seedlings growth. Useful if wanting to apply neat as a mulch to suppress weeds where the ground is 'resting'. Not recommended around trees/bushes as they starve the roots of water and nutrients.



Unfortunately, doesn't appear to deter slugs. Could be attractive, but poisonous, to dogs.

WINTER JOBS

BOUNDARY PATHS

Plot Holders with plots that are next to the external boundaries of the site must ensure that there is a clear path of at least 300mm/2ft at all times. The path MUST be clear of sheds, brambles, plants, bushes, compost bins, rubbish, wheelbarrows etc. to provide a clear access. This is a requirement of our Landlords, the Council.

An incident occurred in November 2022, and access was required, but we were not easily able to respond to the Council's requests as the path was blocked in a number of places.

If your plot borders an external boundary, please take some time this winter to ensure that the 2ft (60cm) clearance for access is maintained. Some existing sheds and compost heaps have historically been sited too close to the boundary, and we normally ask for these to be moved when a plot changes hands. However, please be aware that the council may require them to be moved for access to maintain/replace the fence/wall at any point.

GRASS PATHS AROUND PLOTS - It is your responsibility to maintain the grass paths around your plot. The grass must be regularly cut, and is a job to be shared with your neighbours. The paths must also be kept weed free and trimmed along the edge. The side access paths should be 300mm/2ft wide, but many seem to creep into the plot. The winter is a good time to straighten up the edges - the Site Manager can remark the boundaries if needed. Just ask!

A kindly volunteer cuts the main drives, but the 300mm/2ft edges to the drive, as well as side paths are individual plot holders responsibility.

Putting grass turves in the ruts in the drive is helpful, but please don't put bonfire ash, gravel or the like on the grass drives because it prevents the grass from re-growing next spring.

Access to the Site in Winter - When the weather is very wet, please avoid taking vehicles onto the site as the grass paths very quickly become damaged with deep ruts. Main gates are locked if paths are waterlogged.

Keys—the Big Green Shed remains accessible to all members even when the shop is closed during the winter. Your key to the main gate also opens the door to the community area where you can shelter or make a hot drink.

TREES

Trees on plots must be fruit bearing, and growing on dwarf rootstock. There are a number of trees that are shading the crops on adjacent plots, and overhanging some paths.

Generally it is expected that any tree is pruned, at least annually, and kept below 3m/10ft in height.

Spring is the best time to prune most fruit trees.

Please look out for self set *Holm Oak* trees (also called 'holly leaved oak' / Quercus Ilex), as we have



spotted a number around the site recently.

They should be removed – dug out - as they grow to an enormous evergreen dome more than 20m tall!

If you are in any doubt as to what a tree or bush on your plot might be, please email a photo and we'll try to help.

RECIPES—ROAST PUMPKIN AND SPINACH LAYER

A delicious allotment treat fit for a festive table.

- 750 g pumpkin or butternut squash peeled, deseeded and cut into 1cm slices
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 500 g spinach
- 1 tbsp butter
- **Grated nutmeg**
- 6 fresh lasagne sheets
- 100 g parmesan cheese

1 Roast Pumpkin

Heat oven to 200c

Coat the pumpkin (or squash)

in oil and season

roast until tender

2 Make tomato sauce

soften onion in the oil

add celery and garlic

cook for one minute

add tomato and sugar leave to simmer

season to taste

For the tomato sauce

- 1 medium onion chopped
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 celery stick chopped
- 2 garlic cloves chopped
- 1 can tomatoes
- 1tsp sugar

3 Cook spinach

wilt spinach gently in covered pan for about 4 minutes

chop spinach and add butter, season with salt pepper and

grated nutmeg

4 Make Bechamel sauce

bring the milk to the boil with peppercorns, onion and Bay

leaf, strain and set aside

in another pan put flour and butter heat gently then add the

milk whisking all the time until you have a thick smooth

sauce

For the Bechamel sauce

- 500 ml milk
- pepper corns
- 1/2 onion
- 1 bay leaf
- 50 g plain flour
- 50 g butter

5 Assemble the lasagne

in a large baking dish put a layer of pumpkin followed by a

layer of tomato sauce, lay sheets of lasagne on top, then a layer of bechamel followed by a scattering of spinach and

half the cheese, continue layering and finish with a final

layer of bechamel sauce, then sprinkle the remaining cheese

over the top and bake for 40 mins or until golden and

bubbling

An excellent accompaniment to this dish is:

SWEET POTATO AND ORANGE MASH WITH SAGE BUTTER DRIZZLE

4 sweet potatoes cut into chunks

1 tsp olive oil

1 tbsp orange juice

Pinch orange zest

I tbsp. butter

4 sage leaves chopped

Boil potatoes until tender, drain, mash with oil, orange juice and zest. Add seasoning. Melt butter with sage until it foams and bubbles. Small brown spots will appear in the butter. Pour over mash and serve.
